The following Sunday Ascension formally extended me a call to serve as their full-time missionary pastor. I was delighted to accept, and the St-Onges will continue the work the Lord started through us here seven years ago.

The following day, Sunday, June 19, Ascension gathered for a baby shower for the Prozenkos. Deaconess Emilie, who is expecting a baby boy in September, joined with her husband in a series of "parental trials." We had a great turnout for the "Ba-By-Q" and enjoyed a third Sunday of fellowship.

Later that week Ruth Stone, Deaconess Emilie and I met our city councilor Mary Deros for the first time. Mary has served Parc-Extension on both the borough and city council for over two decades. Years ago, she rented space to Pastor Joshua Hallmann when he served as a missionary attached to Ascension.


We expect a quieter July and August, but one never knows what the Lord has in store. We will continue to share the Good News!


