

April has been a very busy month in Montreal. Some of it has been spectacular – enjoying a solar eclipse for the first time with members and colleagues in the Eastern Townships. Some of it was challenging – dealing with so many cultures and languages comes with lots of opportunities for misunderstandings. Some of it was daunting – dealing, for the first time, with Canada's "hate crime" laws (although thankfully only at a remove). And some of it was joyfully fulfilling – seeing new people brought to Christ in Baptism. April reminds us of all the challenges and rewards of being part of the mission of Christ in the world.



We had almost eighty people attend our open house with the "SPVM," the Montreal police service. Our city counsellor, Mary Deros, also attended. A wide range of issues were discussed including the fact that the Montreal police look after all residents of the city, whether they are citizens, immigrants, or refugees. Everyone who comes to our open houses receives a participation letter.

We regularly invite those who attend our English classes and open houses to worship at Ascension. Faith comes by hearing, after all, and hearing by the Word of God. In March many of them came to worship and stayed to hear more about what it means to be a Christian. Some were not quite ready. But two men from India kept coming back and, after Easter, asked to receive Holy Baptism. Rajesh and Sonu, whose religious background was Hindu, were received as sons of God in Christ on April 28. Thanks to the Lutheran Heritage Foundation both have Small Catechisms in Hindi to study.



Mission Moment

I'm sometimes asked when visiting the United States whether we are adversely impacted by Canada's "hate crime" laws. I tell people that these are only a problem for those advocating physical violence against people of a certain culture, nationality, belief, sexual orientation. Canada is a verv diverse country and there is a desire to keep the peace.

We have had synagogues attacked in Montreal in recent months. One imam who called for the "extermination" of "Zionist aggressors" last November is under investigation.

A pastor known to Ascension is now also being investigated for making similar charges online about Palestinians. This was brought to my attention by our city councillor, and I ended up having a conversation with her and with Montreal police about our church's views on this matter.

What do we believe? That our God's reaction to sin was not to "hate" it, but to deal with it himself. He allowed our hatred of his Son to be the very means of our salvation — his crucifixion. By his wounds our hatreds are healed.


